## PROJECT DESCRIPTION

About 16 million Americans served during World War II, by 2036, there will be no more remaining veterans. We need YOUR help to capture and honor these stories, before they're gone. Become part of history by collecting and submitting oral histories to the Eisenhower Foundation's *Ike's Soldiers* database. By doing so, we honor the soldiers that led us to one of the biggest victories in world history, and provide future generations with the opportunity to hear first-hand accounts about the experience.

Before Dwight D. Eisenhower became President in 1953, he was a five-star general in the United States Army, and served as Supreme Commander of the Allied Expeditionary Forces in Europe. Despite his many medals and awards, he preferred the attention to be directed to the troops he led. The Eisenhower Foundation presents *Ike's Soldiers*, a project dedicated to honoring the stories and personal accounts of veterans of World War II.

### Who

Veterans who served in the United States military during World War II are eligible to share their stories regardless of branch or rank. As contributors to this national preservation effort, volunteers from around the country interview veterans and collect first person accounts of World War II. Any individual or organization may participate in collecting and submitting these stories. Loved ones of deceased veterans, or those unable to provide video, may submit their veteran's World War II service summary in written form.

### What

*Ike's Soldiers* accepts veterans' stories through the biographical data form, original audio, video, and/or written formats. If available, photographs, letters, diaries, journals, military documents, two-dimensional artwork, maps and other memorabilia may be mailed to The Eisenhower Foundation.

We also hope to honor and remember the stories of deceased veterans. To do so, a friend, family member or fan must submit the biographical information of the veteran and any additional service information, personal stories and experiences through the submission page on the *Ike's Soldiers* website. Pictures or artifacts may be sent in to the Eisenhower Foundation. With this, we will be able to create a complete veteran profile.

### When

Begin today! By being part of this process, the veteran or the family member will give *Ike's Soldiers* permission to utilize the story in digital mediums, IKEducation programs, publicity, and/or Eisenhower Foundation programs. It excludes anything that would be sold, making *Ike's Soldiers* a safe place to preserve these accounts.

### Where

Conduct video interviews in any quiet, indoor location such as a home, office or conference room. We recommend that you can set up your video interview space with soft natural light for the highest quality video.

### Why

The mission of the Eisenhower Foundation is to honor and champion the relevance today of the life and leadership of Dwight D. Eisenhower through compelling programs and events that celebrate his legacy. A large part of Eisenhower's life revolved around the military. Additionally, researchers, scholars and educators rely upon these story collections as a primary source. These oral histories are a rich supplement to historical texts and a valued cultural resource. Veterans' family members treasure the memories that are permanently preserved for future generations.



## THE INTERVIEW PROCESS

1. To participate in this project, the veteran you interview **must be a veteran of World War II**. They can be a friend, a family member, or a member of your community, as long as they are willing to share their experience and participate in this project. The goal of the *Ike's Soldiers* project is to collect as many World War II Veterans oral histories as possible. The Eisenhower Foundation will also accept the biographical information, photo(s), and a brief written history from veterans without a video interview through the **General Submissions Page**. With this information, we are able to create a profile for the veteran in the *Ike's Soldiers* searchable database.
2. Once you've connected with a veteran, arrange to meet with them and provide information about the interview. Ask them to wear comfortable clothes or possibly a military jacket to showcase their service. Be sure to plan extra time to complete the required forms and setup/tear down your filming equipment, if needed.
3. Pick a location that is quiet and where you won't be interrupted. We strongly suggest you pick somewhere inside. The most important part of the video interview is sound, so we highly recommend using an additional audio recording device (This can be your phone - please see media requirements section for more information).
4. Set a meeting time and place for the interview with your veteran. Provide a written reminder to help maintain professionalism and help you both remember your appointment!
5. Print out or download all necessary forms beforehand to complete with the veteran. Be sure to test all of your equipment, clear memory cards, and charge batteries for a seamless interview experience.
6. Begin the interview by asking the veteran to state their full legal name, the current date, their service rank and the dates of their service. Please do not ask for or disclose private information such as military serial numbers or Social Security numbers.
7. Conduct your interview respectfully and curiously. Make sure to cover the required questions provided in this packet. Feel free to use the suggested interview format (listed in the [Sample Questions](#)), although it is not required. We want authentic and comfortable conversation, insure the veteran is comfortable by listening and being polite. The veteran can look towards you versus directly into the camera.
8. After the interview, thank your veteran and gather any artifacts or memorabilia they might be willing to donate. Be sure to include in your package the appropriate form so that all items are properly identified.
9. Send in **both** your edited interview and your unedited interview and any other digital materials using the submission form on the website.
  - a. If you are a student, follow the Editing Guidelines in the following pages while creating the video edit to make sure your submission qualifies for the \$50 award. If you do not wish to edit your interview, please submit materials through the General Program.

### ***Asking to interview a veteran...***

## REQUIRED QUESTIONS

What makes this collection of interviews unique is that we have captured these stories in relationship to General Eisenhower's leadership, giving an interesting perspective on history. So in addition to getting each veteran's World War II experiences, **please make sure you ask the veteran\* at least one of the following questions at some point in the interview:**

1. Did you ever have any interactions with General or President Eisenhower?
  - a. If so, what do you remember? Please get as much detail as possible.
  - b. How did he make you feel?
  - c. What did he say or do that impressed you?
  
2. Was there anything significant you remember about being under Eisenhower's command?
  - a. What was his leadership style?
  - b. What kind of an impression did he make on you?
  - c. How did it impact your life?

*\* Not applicable if veteran served in the Pacific Theater.*

## SAMPLE INTERVIEW STRUCTURE

1. Introduction / Biographical information
2. Early Service
3. Wartime Service
4. End of Service
5. Eisenhower Qs
6. Reflection
7. Conclusion
8. Wrap up & thank your veteran for taking the time to share their recollections of their military service.



## SAMPLE INTERVIEW QUESTIONS

It is the interviewer's job to make the interviewee feel comfortable and to be a good listener. Each interview session will be unique. The following is an outline (not a script) to help the interviewer guide the veteran through the conversation. Tailor the questions as you and the veteran see fit, and focus on asking thoughtful follow-up questions on topics of conversation that might be of interest to historians and researchers. Please have at least 10 Questions, including the Questions about Eisenhower Prepped before you start.

### Biographical Details

1. Where were you born?
2. Who are/were your parents and what are/were their occupations?
3. Who are/were your siblings? Names and genders? Which, if any, serve/served in the military?
4. What were your parents' or siblings' feelings about you joining the service?
5. What primary and secondary schools or college did you attend?
6. Did you hold any jobs before entering the service? After?

### Early Days of Service

1. Can you tell us about when you went into the military? Were you drafted, or did you enlist?
2. (If enlisted) Why did you join?
3. What or who did you leave behind (family, child, pet) when you left to serve?
4. In which branch did you enter?
5. (If enlisted) Why did you choose that branch?
6. How did you get to your initial point of entry?
7. What type of training or schooling did you have? (Advance Course Warrant Officer Basic, Warrant Officer Advance, Warrant Officer Senior Course, "Boot-strap" Command and General Staff College or equivalent, War College or equivalent (getting a degree-either Bachelors, Masters or PhD).
8. What is your most vivid memory of your time training or in school? What was the best part? What was the worst part?
9. Does any particular instructor stand out in your mind? If yes, why?
10. What was your first assignment after basic training?
11. Did you receive any specialized training? If so, what?
12. Do you recall your instructors? If so, what were they like?
13. Did you qualify with equipment (vehicles, aircraft, radios, weapons, etc.)?
14. (If Yes) What was training with that equipment like?
15. What was the hardest part of training?
16. Did you receive any promotions? Could you tell me about them?



17. What was the hardest part of the military lifestyle for you to adapt to? Why do you think it was?
18. What was the easiest part of the military lifestyle for you to adapt to? Why do you think it was?

### **Wartime Service**

Recommend using Wartime Service Questions as natural follow ups when individual starts describing wartime service.

1. Where did you serve?
2. What are your recollections of that experience?
3. Were you in a combat, combat support, or combat service support role? Or did the war zone make that designation irrelevant?
4. (If combat/ wartime) How did your combat (wartime) experience change you?
5. What kinds of friendships and camaraderie did you form while serving, and with whom?
6. How did you stay in touch with family and friends?
7. What did you do for recreation or when you were off duty?
8. Do you recall any particularly humorous or unusual events?
9. Was there something you did for "good luck?"
10. What was the best part of your service experience?

### **End of Service**

1. Do you recall the day service ended? Where were you when your service ended?
2. Did you return home? Where were you?
3. How were you received by your family and community?
4. How did you re-adjust to civilian life? Did you work or go back to school?
5. Did the G.I. Bill support your education?
6. How did service change you?
7. Did you continue any friendships after service? For how long?
8. How did service affect the way you relate to others?
9. Did you join a veteran organization?
10. Do you attend reunions?

### **Reflections**

1. How did your military service experiences affect your life?
2. What are some life lessons you learned from your military service?
3. How has your military service impacted your feelings about war and the military in general?
4. What message would you like to leave for future generations who will view/hear this interview?

### **Conclusion**





1. Is there anything you would like to add that we have not covered in this interview?
2. Is there anything you've always wanted to share about your service or veteran experience that you never have?
3. What would you like people to know or remember from your story?

# EDITING GUIDELINES

The purpose of edited videos is to make information readily available and shareable on different media platforms. Editing these videos provides an easily digestible story for the public.

Cutting down a one or two-hour video to 20 - 30 minutes can be challenging. Use this guide to learn what things to cut, how to build a storyline for your interview and discover optional additions to create the best edited video possible for *Ike's Soldiers* database.

## Things to Cut

Before starting, make sure you should have saved the original interview footage on it's own to be submitted in addition to your edited video. Now as you begin the editing process, you also never have to worry about accidentally deleting video footage because you have the original, unedited version you can always pull from. Cutting something means to completely remove it from the video. Here are a few items that you can easily cut:

- Long pauses
- Offensive language
- “Uhms” and stutters
- Irrelevant information - You can determine what is relevant and what is not after you have mapped out the story you choose to tell.

## Story

Chances are, that you and your veteran covered a wide range of moments from their experience. In an interview, it is very easy to get off track from the main story and talk about different aspects of life. This is not a bad thing, however it does not provide a cohesive storyline for the future viewer. Your goal as an editor, is to select the most relevant pieces and weave them together to create a cohesive story. If there are pieces of your interview that you find to be important but don't quite fit the story, we encourage you to create a few mini clips/videos to add along with your submission.

**Try using this diagram to create your storyline:**



- **Exposition:** This is the beginning of your story. Here you can include the veteran's background information, and any details needed to set up the story you want to tell.
- **Inciting Incident:** This is the event in your veteran's life that made them want to join the military. If you're editing a specific event in the veteran's military career, the inciting incident is whatever sets that particular story in motion.
- **Rising Action:** Could be more description of your veteran's situation before they face a challenge.
- **Crisis:** A big challenge that your veteran faced. In most stories, this is where all hope seems to be lost. The situation is bleak and very difficult.
- **Climax:** The moment where everything changes. In most cases, this might be a battle that the veteran fought that changed their perspective.
- **Denouement:** This is how the story wraps up. In this section, questions are answered and wounds begin to heal.
- **End:** This is an excellent place to include some of the answers from the sample questions. A chance for the veteran to reflect on their experience as a whole and share wisdom.

#### **Optional additions:**

These items are not necessary, but if you are more confident in your video editing skills, we recommended to add these things to make your story more powerful and your edit more professional.

- **B-roll:** Can be other angles of the veteran. Footage of the veteran's homes or flipping through old photographs.
- **Captions:** Provide a written transcript of the conversation for historians & researchers to refer to in the case that the veteran is difficult to understand.
- **Voice Over:** Please do not use voice overs to discuss historical events, as we will not be able to use or share the video if there are historical inaccuracies. So to stay on the safe side, we suggest not to use voice overs at all in your edits.

## STUDENT SUBMISSION PROCESS & GUIDELINES

After the interview, thank the veteran. Be sure to take a portrait image and/or collect a photo of them in their uniform to submit digitally (scans preferred). If they have any artifacts that they would allow you to take a picture of, these can be valuable for telling their story. The veteran also has the option to donate these items to Eisenhower Foundation, you can send to the address below.

### **\*IMPORTANT\***

Please be sure to provide a photo of your student I.D. with the materials you submit online or in the physical box in order for your submission to be processed as part of our student program.

### **Video Editing:**

To contribute as a student submission which qualifies you to receive \$50 per interview, students are required to edit their videos according to the guidelines or in a similar respect to videos already found on the website.

Send in BOTH your edited and unedited interview and any other digital materials using the submission form on the website.

After filling out all of the appropriate paperwork, the submission process for your interview and artifacts is fairly simple.
